What are Case Reviews?

Previously called Serious Case
Reviews, Local Child Safeguarding
Practice Reviews are carried out by
the local safeguarding authority (in
our case, Cornwall and the Isles of
Scilly) when a child has died or a
child has been seriously harmed and
there are concerns about how
organisations or professionals worked
together to protect the child.

The reviews are published on Local Authority websites for 12 months and are collated in the National Case Review Repository, managed by the NSPCC. (please note this hyperlink has been pre-set to show Cornwall case reviews but you can change the search term using the box at the top of the page.)

Why are LCSPRs published?

The purpose of the reviews is to identify improvements which are needed and to consolidate good practice. Reviews are not enquiries into how a child died or was seriously harmed, or into who is to blame. These are matters for the coroners and criminal courts as appropriate.

Reviews identify improvements in practice needed to safeguard and promote the welfare of children by:

- establishing what lessons need to be learned from the case about the way in which professionals and organisations work individually and together to safeguard and promote the welfare of children;
- identifying clearly what those lessons are both within and between agencies, how and within what timescales they will be acted on, and what is expected to change as a result;
- improving intra- and inter-agency working to better safeguard and promote the welfare of children.

The findings from Reviews are translated into programmes of action which lead to sustainable improvements and the prevention of death, serious injury or harm to children.

Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly publish Thematic Review Briefings to accompany each review where key findings are summarised.

The NSPCC also create <u>national thematic briefings</u>. Each briefing focuses on a different topic, pulling together key risk factors and practice recommendations to help practitioners understand and act upon the learning from case reviews.

The NSPCC also carry out a triennial analysis of case review and published the most recent, looking at reviews from 2017 - 2019 in December 2022. This Link will take you to the report detailing findings for Education and Early Help settings.
