Forest Schools Curriculum Overview



Ethos

Forest School is a unique educational experience and process that offers children the opportunity to succeed and develop confidence and self-esteem through hands-on learning experiences in a woodland environment.

Children engage in motivating and achievable tasks and activities throughout the year and in almost all weathers, with the appropriate footwear and clothing. Children will work with tools, play, learn and begin to understand the boundaries of behaviour: both physical and social. They will grow in confidence, self- esteem and motivation whilst developing an understanding of the natural world.

Origins and Purpose

The Forest School concept originates in Denmark, originally aimed at pre-school children, where it was found that children who had attended forest school then arrived at school with strong social and communication skills, having the ability to work in groups effectively, generally had high self-esteem and a confidence in their own abilities. These foundations helped them to raise their academic achievements

Aims

The children will be encouraged to:

- develop personal and social skills;
- work through practical problems and challenges;
- use tools to create, build or manage;
- discover how they learn best;
- pursue knowledge that interests them;
- learn how to manage failures;
- build confidence in decision making and evaluating risk;
- develop practical skills;

- understand the benefits of a balanced and healthy lifestyle;
- explore connections between humans, wildlife and the Earth;
- regularly experience achievement and success;
- reflect on learning and experiences;
- develop their language and communication skills;
- improve physical motor skills;
- become more motivated;
- improve their concentration skills;
- improve their communication;
- explore the world through all the senses available to them.

Progression of Skills

In each year group, the children will be encouraged to increase their independence as they learn, practise and apply essential outdoor-learning skills. As the children will be outside most of the time, the activities the children participate in will depend greatly on the weather. As forest school is child led, the children will have the opportunity to engage in a range of activities that they have helped to construct. Some may use the material provided to do something completely different and explore the boundaries of independent learning.
