# **Governor Update January 2019**

Last half-term's Governors meetings have, as usual, covered the wide range of issues that encompass running a school. The regular policy reviews and background work remain vitally important to ensure the school continues to have a stable and secure foundation, whilst allowing time to focus on specific issues being faced and the evolving strategies being employed within the school to build a cohesive approach to the children's education from Reception to Year 6 – no mean feat!

Of particular interest has been:

The introduction of Maths Mastery this year.

Consideration of the process and benefits to becoming a dyslexia friendly school.

Discussion over potential accreditation under the Artsmark Award, in reflection of the fantastic work evolving around Fab Fridays and throughout the curriculum.

Future changes with regards to OFSTED inspection regime, which is felt to place greater recognition and importance on non-academic activities taking place within a school, which is felt to be to our advantage!

Reviewing pupil attainment and, perhaps more importantly for Perran-ar-Worthal School, pupil progress by considering reports and statistics provided by central government, to identify areas of strength and weakness and to ensure the focus remains as agreed within the School Improvement Plan.

Engagement of an experienced educational consultant to critically assess and mentor the school, its governance, leadership, teaching and activities to ensure it continues to improve and better itself wherever possible.

On a more personal level, I have been particularly involved in various interesting issues:

Considering where we may wish to focus future finance, if available, to improve the fabric of the school, ahead of budget approval in the next few months.

Approval of funding to start the long hoped for improvement of the EYFS outside area.

Considering the formulation of a cohesive plan with regards to the general outdoor space at the school, to tie in with the fantastic funding being raised by FOPS/parents for the outdoor shelter.

Looking at bringing together a number of important participants within the village and parents to identify whether we can reduce the risks associated from road traffic during the busy periods at the beginning and end of each school day.

Seeking assurances from Cornwall Council with regards to the stability of Interserve, the private company who maintain and control the school building under a county-wide PFI (Private Finance Initiative) scheme, and who have been reported as being in serious financial difficulty.

All the governors enjoyed the festive week(s), and look forward to supporting, questioning, challenging where appropriate and helping guide the school through 2019.


