Does your child use TikTok? Although the minimum user age, as set by the company, is 13, many children under this age are using the app. TikTok are releasing a 'Family Safe Mode' to give parents greater control over their child's account. Click on the logo to take you to a BBC article explaining more about the app and the new feature.



If your child accesses YouTube, you may want to consider either using YouTube Kids (available as an app or as a website), which filters content by age, or using the main website in restricted mode.
