As a Cornish textile artist, my work is inspired by my surroundings.

I have always loved drawing and painting. I endeavour to capture the world around me, the landscapes, the light, colours and textures.

Wet Felting has become my passion. I get completely lost in making a unique piece of colourful fabric from wool roving. It's like magic watching the individual fibres and silks bind together to create a landscape or sculptured vessel. I love the feel of it between my fingers, it handles well as a textile. It's warm, strong and versatile. I take fine strands of merino wool and blend them to create the colours I need.

To me it is 'painting' in a different way.

Felting is an ancient technique, dating from approximately 2,000 years ago in which wool fibres are matted together to create an unwoven textile.

In order to create wet felted wool, you need heat, moisture and agitation.

There are different ways of making felt I use wet felting and needle felting.

Wet felting uses water, soap and agitation to interlock and compact wool fibres together, needle felting uses barbed needles to stab and tangle the wool fibres together.




